Good News! Unity Oldland Methodist Church in the Bristol and South Gloucestershire Circuit has gained a Silver Eco Church award and St Mark's Cheltenham in the Gloucestershire Circuit has gained a bronze award – congratulations to all involved in gaining those awards.

Churches in the district which already have awards include: in Bristol and South Gloucestershire Circuit: Westbury on Trym (silver); in Gloucestershire: Cheltenham Bethesda, Stonehouse, Stroud and Tewkesbury (silver) and Bishop's Cleeve, Cheltenham St Mark's, Cirencester, Dursley, Nailsworth, Tetbury, Tibberton (all bronze); in North East Somerset and Bath: Stratton House MHA, Southdown Horizon and Nexus (all bronze); in Gordano: Nailsea (silver); in Wiltshire United Area: St Andrew's Devizes (silver) and Whitley (bronze); in North Wilts: Sheldon Road Chippenham (bronze); and in Upper Thames: Wotton Bassett (bronze).

Snapshot: Yatton Methodist Church – working towards Ecochurch “Yatton Methodist Church has been working towards Ecochurch bronze for just over a year, though Covid has complicated matters. We found filling in the workbook quite easy and we were already doing a lot to help us to move towards Bronze. To get there we have a few things to do with the small amount of land we have. We are considering bee- and butterfly-friendly flowers, bug hotels and doing our own composting to get the required credits, but were amazed to find how much we do in the normal run of things that are considered to be good environmental practice.”

COP26 – what is it and what does it stand for? COP stands for Conference of the Parties, and will be attended by over 200 leaders of countries that signed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) - a treaty agreed in 1994. The last conference, **COP25**, was held in Madrid, Spain, in November 2019 with Greta Thunberg giving a big speech at the event. The COP meeting in Madrid finished with lots of big issues unresolved, but an agreement was made about cutting carbon dioxide - a gas that causes global warming. Each nation agreed to devise a plan to cut their carbon emissions by the next conference in Glasgow.



Climate Sunday Local churches across Britain and Ireland are encouraged to hold a climate-focused service on any Sunday before 5 September 2021. Free resources are available to suit every tradition and style of worship. During their local Climate

Sunday, churches are invited to do one or more of three things:

1. **Worship:** Hold a climate-focused service, to explore the theological and scientific basis of creation care and action on climate, to pray, and to commit to action.
2. **Commit:** Make a commitment as a local church community to taking long term action to reduce its own greenhouse gas emissions.
3. **Speak up:** Join with other churches and wider society by adding its name to a common call for the UK government to take much bolder action on climate change in this country in advance of COP26, and to strengthen its credibility to lead the international community to adopt a step change in action at COP26. The culmination of the campaign will be a national Climate Sunday event on Sunday 5th September this year, to share church commitments and pray for bold action and courageous leadership at COP26.

Climate Sunday has been organised by Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) with support from charities including CAFOD, Christian Aid, Tearfund, A Rocha UK, and Operation Noah. To register visit the Climate Sunday website <https://ctbi.org.uk/climate-sunday/>.
